1. INTRODUCTION

Mosaic is a form of art that assembles small pieces of materials into a unified whole. With the variety of materials used in mosaic art, Mosaic art has outstanding features such as:

- Advantages from the physical properties of materials: wear resistance, high hardness, good compression resistance, water resistance, acid resistance, salt alkalinity, color fastness, no dust, moss, etc.

- Advantage from the richness of materials, color sensitivities, ... of materials.

- Advantage from the ability to create aesthetic shapes on demand and according to cultural characteristics.

- Advantages from flexible production technology: manual or industrial production, small or large quantity, etc., which is flexible according to actual conditions and requirements.

Because of the above-mentioned advantages, Mosaic art has been applied in life and architecture for a long time and

is increasingly popular. Understanding how Mosaic art has contributed to life and especially in the design and construction of architectural works in the world as well as in Vietnam helps to understand the values of this art towards the more effective application of Mosaic art in the future.

2. OVERVIEW ABOUT MOSAIC ART

2.1. Overview about Mosaic art

Mosaic art is a form of decorative art that creates images from small pieces of materials such as colored glass, stone, ceramics, metal or other materials.

The Mosaic application can create themed artwork with an investment in layout, content, color materials, etc., but it can be merely a decorative motif for landscapes of buildings such as sidewalks, flower beds, etc. and sometimes it does not need a specific theme but still achieve visual effects. The name of the Mosaic material is specified as follows: Mosaic is named after its material's name. For example: Mosaic made of pieces of glass can be called glass mosaic, Mosaic made of natural stones is called natural stone Mosaic or ceramic Mosaic is the name of Mosaic from ceramic pieces, etc.

In Vietnam, Mosaic art is often found in architectural works such as pagodas, temples, mausoleums, etc. With the absorption of Western Mosaic art combined with Traditional aesthetics, mosaic art in Vietnam has created many unique values for architectural works with its own characteristics and national identity. Mosaic art flourished during the Nguyen Dynasty, careful mosaic materials and techniques made architectural works in Vietnam during this period sustainable and able to be resistant to time and harsh weather to survive up to this day. Compared to the application of mosaic art in the world, mosaic art in Vietnam has created its own unique and lasting artistic imprints throughout the nation's history.

2.2. Overview of materials used in Mosaic art

In the world of Mosaic art, there is a word used to refer to all the materials used to make Mosaic works of art, which is Tesserae - translated into Vietnamese means mosaics or mosaic units.

Any material used to create Mosaic art is called a Mosaic material - Tesserae. The world uses a lot of materials and improvises according to the preferences of the artist to create Mosaic art, the common feature of these materials is small shapes.

If it is a natural material originated from existing objects such as stone, gravel, glass, mirror, crockery, porcelain, etc., it will be easy to cut into pieces, then use traditional methods, or modern methods to craft manually. As for man - made materials such as crystal, grained glass, it often uses modern methods. However, the materials used in Mosaic art are mainly still in four main categories: glass, ceramics, stone and some other special materials.

3. HISTORY OF FORMATION AND DEVELOPMENT OF MOSAIC ART

3.1. History of formation and development of Mosaic art in the world

Based on the historical development of Mosaic art, its characteristics and worldwide distribution, it can be summarized and classified as follows:

- Byzantine Mosaic.
- Classic Mosaic.
- Mosaic in Medieval Rome and Venice.
- Islamic Mosaic.
- Latin American Mosaic.
- Mosaic and Art Nouveau.
- Orient Mosaic.
- Contemporary Mosaic.

In summary, Mosaic art has been formed and developed throughout historical periods and associated with architecture and other forms of visual arts. It was formed from different civilizations and thus also reflected different cultural characteristics for each generation and each nation. Over thousands of years, this art has been maintained, preserved and developed more and more strongly. That is the feature that needs to be paid attention when researching and promoting the application of this type of Mosaic art in the future.

3.2. The appearance of Mosaic art in Vietnam

In the ancient folk in Vietnam, it was not called Mosaic art.

Mosaic art in Vietnam has existed for a long time and can be found in many places from simple crafts in the countryside to majestic works of art in the royal court. However, there were no records of numbers and documents about its origin and time of appearance. What is known today is only through meager historical records, artifacts or traditional industries in traditional villages. The best known ones are porcelain mosaic art, mother-of-pearl mosaic art (pearl mosaic, snail mosaic) or wood mosaic art.

4. MOSAIC ART IN LIFE AND ARCHITECTURE

4.1. Mosaic art in life

Mosaic art in real life is usually a figurative work in accordance with the author's wishes, mostly associated with sculptures, murals, decorative items or other objects.

For the climatic conditions of Vietnam, the application of Mosaic art to the surface of visual works (paintings - statues - household items,...) is extremely necessary because it ensures the durable and aesthetic use that is not degraded over time; Usually it is applied manually.

4.2. Mosaic art in architecture

4.2.1. Decoration in urban landscape architecture

Mosaic art is used quite popularly and diversely in decorating, creating specific features, emphasizing or attracting visuals for

urban landscape architecture. We can see the appearance of Mosaic art in parks, squares, roads, etc. In urban landscape architecture, the use of Mosaic art to decorate flower beds, aquariums and fountains, etc., is not only to create aesthetics for works that highlight the space, but also to prevent slippery, sliding, dirt, moss, etc. during the use time.

4.2.2. Architectural facade decoration

In addition, Mosaic art gives the work stability with all harsh weather conditions, especially hot and humid climates in Vietnam.

4.2.4. Decoration of architectural details

When observing architectural works from the perspective of miniatures, architectural details now play an important role, directly impacting the viewer's vision. Whether the work is evaluated aesthetically or not depends entirely on the combination of these details, so the application of Mosaic art in the decoration of architectural details also brings optimal efficiency in many aspects: creating aesthetic effect, increased resistance to weather and climate for structural components of the building, ... and another important feature, that is the sensibility of the material will show relatively clear the emotional intentions on architectural details through Mosaic art.

The application of Mosaic art may transform a specific object through creativity of the maker with patterns, compositions, colors, rhythms, lines, materials, etc. in order to transform an object into a more beautiful and attractive one, serving the essential needs of people both physically and mentally.

expression, aesthetics and expression are very wide.
